Training Bulletin

The RYA Training Inspection took place during the Sea Monkeys session on Saturday 14 June and the Club successfully received accreditation. Thanks to the instructors, Sea Scout instructors and rescue boat support for their hard work in preparation for the inspection.

Training is well underway with a small and enthusiastic group of beginners getting out onto the water and sometimes getting wet. The RYA Powerboat training took place in March with six trainees and some half decent weather. It wasn't

too cold and the sessions were successfully hosted by instructors from Cramond Sea Scouts.



This year we have twelve Sea Monkeys enrolled with a good mix of Club members and Sea Scouts. The Sea Monkeys have managed to get on the water every session so far and are making great progress, rigging and sailing but particularly with tidying the changing rooms!

We had a number of enquiries for the RYA Dinghy training, but the dates in April were difficult for some prospective members. Nevertheless, we have had a couple of trainees who are working on their RYA Level 2 over the summer. The timing of adult dinghy training is always an issue and any suggestions as to when and how it could be improved are welcome.

Between the Sea Monkeys, Cadets and Freesail sessions there seems to be a good number of enthusiastic dinghy sailors working to improve their skills and racing technique.

ESCW Changes

For many years, East Coast Sailing Week has been the premier racing series on the east coast, alternating between the Tay, the Forth and Northumberland. However, numbers have been falling, particularly when the event is not on the Forth.

Therefore, in an attempt to re-invigorate the event, the steering group has been considering plans to move to a new four year cycle. This proposed cycle would mean that the event would be held on the Forth every two years, alternating between the Tay and Northumberland on the other years.

If this is accepted by all the member clubs, then the schedule would be as follows:

2014: Northumberland (Blyth, 16th - 19th July)

2015: Forth (Port Edgar)

2016: Tay

2017: Forth (Granton or Port Edgar)

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Did you watch the BBC TV programme on 6th May about the Kelpies? If not, try to find it on the internet. It starts off with aerial shots of these massive and impressive structures then takes you into the story of the vision and determination of the artist/sculptor Andy Scott, who brought these mythical beasts to life, and already they have become another international tourist attraction to rival the Falkirk Wheel nearby.

The original idea was to have them on huge hinged platforms so that the heads moved up and down as water was pumped in or out of the sea lock. This led to some canal workers nicknaming them "The Nodding Donkeys". However, there were too many practical problems with that idea and now the Kelpies are built on solid ground on either side of a new lock leading into the Forth and Clyde canal from a new canal section at the river Carron just south of the M9 motorway bridge.



Anyone who has used the old sea lock will know there was a very short time window to enter the canal and pass under the road and pipe bridges on the river Carron, particularly if you had to lower your mast at Grangemouth Yacht Club.

Well Scottish Canals have now built a new sea lock just before the first pipe-bridge, with a mast crane similar to the one at Bowling, but much smaller (sensibly.)

This leads into a new section of canal parallel to the river which passes under the Kerse Road at a new lifting bridge, then through a tunnel under the M9 giving access into the Kelpies basin. The new canal and sea lock now give a generous 2 hours access each side of high water. The attached photo shows the approach on the new canal under the motorway, with the Kelpies towering majestically beyond and the river Carron on the right.

The Kelpies were officially inaugurated with a dazzling display of lights and fireworks on the evenings of 17th and 18th of April, attended by tens of thousands of spectators. Since then, over 150,000 people have visited the site to see the amazing sculptures.

I had hoped to take *Jester* into the new sea lock in April then on to the Kelpies, but there was never any information about the opening date, and personal family matters have curtailed our boating activities so far this year.

If you are planning to use the canal this summer, you need to give the canal people plenty of warning of your intended transit dates which can be done through the canal booking service phone number. Also talk to the guys at the sea lock as they will update you on the current situation (not just the official spiel from head office) and will give practical advice on approach and times etc.



Finally, best of luck, take your time and enjoy the canal.

As their name suggests, the core repertoire of this talented six-piece combo are hits penned by the song writing team of Burt Bacharach and Hal David, mainly dating from the 60s and 70s.

We were therefore treated to renderings of classic songs such as *Always Something There to Remind Me*, *Can't Take My Eyes Off Of You*, and *Do You Know The Way To San Jose?* You know, the sort of cheesy songs you pretended to hate at the time, but somehow, almost 50 years on, you somehow know every word of the lyrics! Glancing around the room, you could see everyone's lips moving in sync with lead singer Diana Saunderson, who delivered the songs in impeccable style.

Dunbar Harbour

The visitors' berth is now on the east wall on the north side of the bridge. It dries approximately 2 hours each side of HW.

For most visitors this will mean berthing where you can and then moving to the visitors' berth when water permits.

The deepest water is at the first berth you reach on entry, below the castle, so can be busy.

It may be possible to make arrangements to berth temporarily below the castle to make an early departure to carry the flood tide up the Forth.

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The first of the three open events scheduled in 2014 to compete for the National 12 Lairwell Trophy was held at Cramond Boat Club on Sunday 25th May. The competitors arrived on Sunday morning to find the weather slightly different from the forecast. While the wind direction was correct (north-easterly blowing straight up the river Almond), the strength appeared considerably underestimated, with 25mph winds being recorded out in the race area.

Nevertheless all five competitors set out. After a tricky launching exercise off of a lee shore, the competitors found conditions out in the race area not much easier with a difficult quartering swell making the reaches quite exciting!

Angus Beyts and Andrew Harris sailing *Reflection* were the last to leave the shore, then decided that discretion was the better part of valour and were also the first to return ashore! As the OOD Drew Pratt attempted to finalise the start line and starting sequence the rescue crews were called in to action as Will Mitchell and Lois Spooner sailing *Not Another Aardvark* fell in, shortly followed by Piotr Wojtczuk and Anna Basista sailing *Fair Lady*. Thankfully the rescue team of Euan, Lawrie and Reginaldo successfully recovered them and their boat to the safety of the shore.

Whilst this was going on Alex and Denise Tulloch in *China Crisis* and Ed Willett and Sarah Smith in *Water Nymph* planed up and down awaiting the commencement of proceedings. However with the wind showing no signs of decreasing, the rescue teams fully occupied and with only two boats remaining it was decided to abandon the race.

Once all safely ashore the competitors decided to abandon any further racing for the day. A lunch of soup and rolls was enjoyed by all amidst some of the post race chat and craic! The bottles of wine which were to be handed out at prize giving were distributed to all entrants ... for turning up! It is hoped to re-schedule the event to later in the year. Watch this space.

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Honda Youth RIB Championships

The annual Scottish Finals for the Honda RYA Youth RIB Championships took place on Saturday 7th June at Lochwinnoch. A total of 18 competitors, including two Cramond Scouts representing CBC, were put through their paces using the new Honda Highfield RIB.

Fortunately, the predicted wild weather stayed away until the last competitors had finished although those packing up at the end got totally drenched.



There were two age groups, and the competition was fierce as the winner of each group goes on to represent Scotland at the Championship Finals taking place at Southampton Boat Show in September 2014.

In the 13-16 yrs age group, Scott Stevenson from Cramond finished in second place, only 2 seconds behind the winner Robyn Dougall from the Scottish Powerboat and Yacht Academy, who has won the event twice before.

This was a superb achievement from Scott against some very tough completion and after very little practice.

Granton Harbour

A channel approximately 30m wide has been dredged from Granton harbour mouth to the south end of the pontoon, approximately 2m deeper than previously.

This will provide a wider access window to the Edinburgh Marina pontoon facility.

Good news for deep-keel yachts, but probably doesn't make much difference to CBC mudlarks.

This was Scott's second attempt at the trophy, having taken part a few years ago at Port Edgar when he came just outside the prizes in fourth. This was his last chance to enter as next year he will be too old.

Well done also to Tom Kistruck in his first attempt at the challenge. Although he finished outside the prizes, he put in a really good effort with no faults on his run.

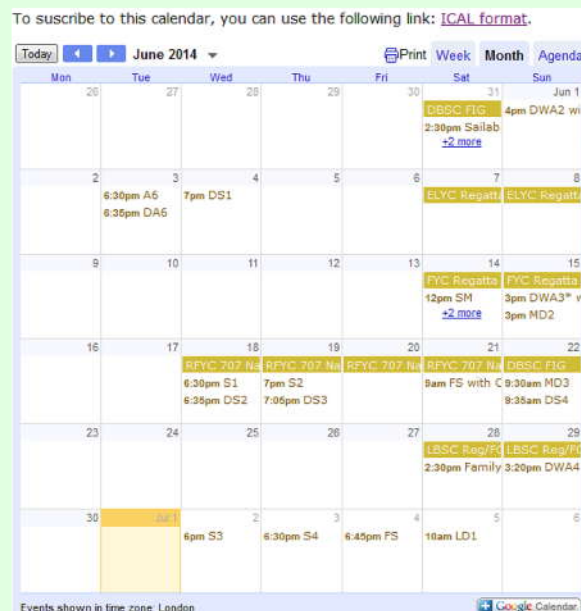
CBC Sailing Events Calendar

Those of you who are not hooked on modern technology, look away now. Those of you who are, you probably already know this ...

If you use an electronic calendar such as Google Calendar or Outlook, you can import the dates and times of club sailing events into your own calendar to save having to check old-fashioned bits of paper.

Just go to the Calendar page on the [club website](#). If you use Google Calendar, click on the **+ Google Calendar** button at the foot of the date grid which will ask you to log into your Google account and add the CBC calendar to your own. If you use another calendar application, click on the **ICAL format** link at the top of the date grid and you will be asked to choose which application you want to use (e.g. Microsoft Outlook). Simple!

Now you can have easy access to club events from your computer, tablet or phone whenever you want! Who says the Cramond Boat Club is old-fashioned? Many thanks to Trevor Mackay and Piotr Wojtczuk for setting this up for us - if you have any problems with it, Piotr will be happy to help.
